## Principal's Address – Mrs Robb

### **Term 3 Begins**

Welcome back to Term 3. All students have returned happy and refreshed and quickly settled into teaching and learning programs.

#### Compass

Thank you to all our parents who have helped make our school transition to Compass a smooth one. Hopefully, you are all finding the app very easy to use particularly in terms of receiving messages from the school. Please let us know if you are having any issues with this and we will endeavour to help you problem solve.

### **Term 3 Staffing**

We have had some slight changes to our staffing for the remainder of the year. Mrs Katie Tapscott is taking leave from her Home Economics position for the remainder of the year. We are lucky enough that we have had a qualified Home Economics teacher move into the area and Miss Lauren French will be covering Home Economics for the remainder of the year.

Jerramungup DHS was invited by the Education Department of WA to take part in the Small Group Tuition Project being run across a handful of schools in our state. This is to be an intervention program in either Math or English to help support our students who struggle in these areas. We already have a fabulous intervention program in Literacy being run by Mrs Bailey at school so we have chosen to look at how we can support our students further in Numeracy. This project is being led by Miss Fuqua, and she has dropped some of her other classes to make this happen so we have welcomed Mrs Laura Brooks into the school, and she will be taking the High School Health and some of our primary Drama classes on a Monday.

#### **Attendance**

Please remember to look at your child's attendance data in their report for Semester One. The School Education Act of 1999 requires compulsory aged students to attend school on a regular basis. If a student is absent for 10 or more half days per term, we are required under the act to communicate with parents/care givers to ascertain where necessary reasons for the absences and to help so that improvement in attendance can be achieved.

Through Compass if your child's attendance falls below a certain level you will automatically receive and email about this. This is a requirement for our accountability, even if it is due to ongoing illness that your child has been absent. If your child was absent for less than 80%, they are not regularly attending in this attendance cycle. We do understand that when we live where we do days have to be taken off from time to time to attend appointments in Albany etc, however please remember that the teachers prepare sequential learning programs and if students miss days here and there they can quite often miss out on whole chunks of learning and do not get the opportunity to demonstrate what is asked of them for the purpose of reporting to parents at the end of the semester.

### 2026 Enrolments

We are starting to get towards that time of the year where we are looking at our numbers for 2026 and starting to do some planning for class structures and staffing. If you know of anyone with a child who is Kindy age next year, please encourage them to come into the office to grab and enrolment form. Also, if your child or children will not be attending Jerramungup DHS in 2026 can you please let the front office know ASAP so we can start with our planning sooner rather than later to ensure that we have the best staff available to teach your children.

### **Building Your Child's Vocabulary**

A crucial aspect of a child's literacy skills is having an expansive vocabulary. It is one thing for a child to be able to read well, but if they have limited understanding of words and their meanings then understanding what is being read is difficult. Obviously, the quality of a child's written expression will also be determined by their ability to use a wide range of vocabulary. This is something we are working on as a school, but it is also something you can work on as parents. Some ways you can do this:

- For young children when you are reading to your child, ensure that you spend some time clarifying the meanings of words that they may not have encountered before. Try and use these words in subsequent conversations to reinforce the meanings.
- Focus on language usage at home, use whatever opportunities possible to widen the range of
  words encountered by your child. Family viewing of TV and films can provide this opportunity. We
  value being friendly, approachable and responsive to the needs of our community
- Conversations should include language that stretches a child's understanding of words. There is an enormous range of internet-based games and tablet apps that you can use. A simple Google search would lead you to these. Games like Scrabble and Boggle are also well known and help to increase a child's knowledge of words. I Spy and the Alphabet game where children in turn have to think about a word that starts with a particular letter are also valuable vocabulary building games.
- Encouraging reading at home. Ensure that you have books at home and that this includes fiction and non-fiction material. Non-fiction books on a wide variety of topics, in particular, can expose a child to a wide range of different words.
- For young children don't miss an opportunity to use signs and other kinds of environmental print as a way to learn about new words and phrases. Shopping excursions or indeed any family excursion into the world beyond the home are opportunities for you as parents to question and build a child's understanding about the language that is used to describe the environment they are in. I am sure that you can expand on this list.

A wide vocabulary is important; please don't assume that this just somehow magically happens. A healthy functional understanding of words and their meanings does require explicit teaching both at school and at home.

## **Interschool Cross Country - Kojonup**

On Friday, 27th June, a group of enthusiastic and determined students travelled to Kojonup to represent Jerramungup District High School at the 2025 Interschool Cross Country Carnival. Competing against students from surrounding District High Schools, our runners demonstrated exceptional resilience, sportsmanship, and team spirit throughout the day.

Despite the chilly winter conditions and a challenging course, our students gave their best efforts in every race. We are incredibly proud of their commitment, positive attitudes, and the encouragement they showed to one another and their peers from other schools.




### Year 1 – 4 Aladdin Excursion
